Teaching English for a Global World: Can Global Citizenship Be Taught?

Abstract

Let's be honest—every teacher has (at some point in their career) felt the pain of 'imposter syndrome'. I know I have. A great deal of this self-doubt stems from questions we ask ourselves and our inability to answer these questions (to our own satisfaction) fully. Global Citizenship Through English:
Embedding Cultural Understanding in Language Instruction

Abstract

English language teaching must extend beyond the confines of grammar and vocabulary to embrace cultural competence, fostering effective cross-cultural communication. As the demand for global communication increases, teachers are tasked not only with helping students grasp language skills but also with preparing them to engage confidently across diverse cultural contexts. This approach encourages learners to navigate various speech acts—such as making requests, offering suggestions, issuing threats, and expressing farewells—while understanding the cultural nuances that shape language use. To equip students with the communicative skills necessary for global citizenship, English language educators must integrate cultural awareness into their teaching practices. Teacher training should focus on incorporating artistic elements into lesson plans, designing activities that promote cross cultural understanding, and guiding students in performing speech acts appropriately across diverse cultural contexts. By addressing both linguistic accuracy and socio-cultural appropriateness, teachers can foster a learning environment where students develop the skills to communicate effectively, respectfully, and meaningfully with people from diverse cultural backgrounds. This integration of cultural competence into language curricula is essential for preparing students to navigate the complexities of a multicultural world, ensuring they are equipped to thrive in global interactions.

Be a Mindful Reader

Abstract

The Be a Mindful Reader workshop provided valuable insights into fostering deeper student engagement with texts. It reinforced the idea that mindful reading is not just about comprehension but also about fostering a reflective and critical approach to textual analysis. One of the most compelling aspects of the session was the identification of common obstacles that prevent students from engaging with texts effectively, such as distractions, lack of motivation, and difficulty in recognizing textual structures. Understanding these barriers is essential for designing interventions that encourage more meaningful reading habits. A particularly useful takeaway was the introduction of the QDAFI approach, which offers a structured method for analyzing experimental reports. This approach, along with techniques like "What it does" and "What it says" statements, provided concrete strategies to help students navigate complex texts. These tools emphasize the importance of not only understanding content but also recognizing the underlying structure and purpose of a text, which can significantly enhance students' analytical skills. The workshop also underscored the role of course design, assignments, and grading in reinforcing mindful reading. By aligning assessment strategies with thoughtful engagement rather than superficial reading, educators can encourage students to approach texts with greater care and critical awareness. This aspect of the session was particularly thought-provoking highlighting the need for institutional and pedagogical shifts to support deeper learning.

The Impact of the Use of Digital Texts on Reading Comprehension for Fourth Graders

Abstract

The research "The Impact of the Use of Digital Texts on Reading Comprehension for Fourth Graders" examines the impact of digital texts on reading comprehension and students' attitudes toward reading among fourth-grade EFL learners in Makassed schools in Beirut, Lebanon. The research seeks to determine whether there is a significant difference in reading comprehension scores and reading attitudes between students using digital texts and those using printed texts. A guasi-experimental design employing a mixed-methods approach was used to enhance the validity and depth of the findings. Quantitative data were collected through pre- and post-tests to measure reading comprehension, while qualitative insights were gathered through pre- and post-focus group discussions with the experimental group. The study involved 51 fourth-grade students from private Makassed school. The research findings revealed that students using digital texts developed a more positive attitude toward reading and demonstrated improved reading comprehension compared to those using printed texts. The results effectively answered the research questions, highlighting the benefits of digital texts in enhancing student engagement and learning outcomes. The presentation is going to contribute to understanding how digital texts influence reading comprehension and students' engagement with reading, offering practical implications for EFL instruction and the integration of digital resources in primary education.

This workshop is designed for English language teachers who want to integrate mediation techniques into their lessons, helping students develop essential communication skills for both academic and real-life conflict resolution.



How can you engage your students with different artificial intelligence (AI) tools critically and ethically? Whether looking at AI-generated pictures or chatting with Chatbots, students need to do it right.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is no longer a concept of the future; it is an integral part of our daily lives and education systems. While many educational curricula focus on teaching the technical aspects of AI, there's a growing need to engage students ethically and critically with the technology (Poole & Mackworth, 2023). This interactive workshop will provide educators with engaging, hands-on activities that encourage students to question, analyze, and responsibly use AI tools.

During the workshop, the presenter will share dynamic classroom activities she has successfully experimented with. The activities focus on the students' critical interaction with AI tools, such as chatbots, AI-generated images, deepfake videos, and Suno AI, to assess their creativity and reliability, identify biases, and uncover misinformation. Moreover, the workshop attendees will learn how to structure ethical debates, fact-checking exercises, and critical thinking challenges that spark curiosity and deepen understanding. 


